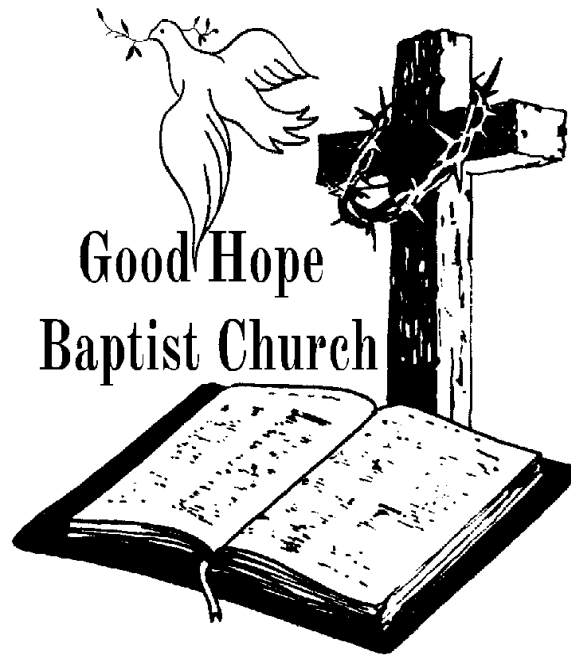


It's Who You Know

Luke 16:19-23



Living Together In The Love Of God

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FOCAL Read Responsively Luke 16:19-23 There was a certain rich man, which was clothed in purple and fine linen, and fared sumptuously every day: (20) And there was a certain beggar named Lazarus, which was laid at his gate, full of sores, (21) And desiring to be fed with the crumbs which fell from the rich man's table: moreover the dogs came and licked his sores. (22) **And it came to pass, that the beggar died, and was carried by the angels into Abraham's bosom: the rich man also died, and was buried; (23) And in hell he lift up his eyes, being in torments, and seeth Abraham afar off, and Lazarus in his bosom.**

Opening Illustration Each of us have an address, a place where we live. This address may change because you move, or may change because the roads are renamed by the government. The first time I tried to find my house at night in the dark I was using my GPS, the Global Positioning System. I missed my turn because the GPS has my road listed as "Creek Bend Lane" and not "Walter Ridge Drive". My road was obviously – at some point – renamed. When Sherry and I were in Tennessee the local Church met in a building on the corner of Rock Hill and Tom's Road. "Tom's Road" was actually named by a child many years ago. When the surveyors were mapping that area this particular gravel road had no posted name. One of the surveyors asked a little girl what the road was, and she responded "It's Tom's Road", because her little friend Tommy lived on that road. Hence it became "Tom's Road".

Just as you have a physical address – a place where you live and receive your mail – one day you will have an *eternal* address. Just as you choose your *earthly* address

you have or will choose your *eternal* address. Your *eternal* address is not on this earth. It is *not* the *Grave*, not the *Graveyard*, though many people think this – based on what you see written on tombstones.

In the Old Chapel Hill Cemetery, a graveyard located on the campus of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill one of the tombstones reads:

**I was Carolina Born
and Carolina bred
and here I lay
Carolina dead!**

Somebody wrote in to Reader's Digest, saying they came across a grave quite overgrown with grass. On the tombstone was written:

**Pause, stranger, when you pass me by,
For as you are, so once was I.
As I am now, so you will be.
Prepare to die, and follow me.**

Scratched underneath these words somebody had written:

**To follow you I'm not content
Until I know which way you went!**

Everyone has an address, a place they will go following this life – and it is not in the graveyard. Most Americans believe in Heaven, but only a hand full believe that there is a Hell. Of those who believe there is a Hell, only a few believe they are going there. **Pastor Greg Laurie** stated that "**For every American who believes they are**

going to Hell, there are 120 who believe they're going to Heaven".

This is in direct contrast to what the Lord Jesus Christ taught. Jesus said that:

Matthew 7:13-14 Enter ye in at the strait gate: for wide [is] the gate, and broad [is] the way, that leadeth to destruction, and many there be which go in thereat: (14) Because strait [is] the gate, and narrow [is] the way, which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it.

The Gate to Hell is **wide and broad**, and many will go there. The Gate to Heaven, on the other hand, is **strait – filled with obstacles – and narrow**. Sadly, most people are headed to Hell, and do not even know it. People use “Hell” as a curse in order to punctuate or emphasize a sentence. But Hell is more than a punctuation, or an imaginary place. Hell is a real place. Our Lord Jesus Christ spoke more about Hell than any other New Testament writer.

Jesus talks about Hell in our focal text today. He talks about two people – I believe, very real people. Some people have thought that this text we are reading is a parable, a fictional story used to illustrate a Bible truth. Jesus often used parables when He preached. Our text today is *not* a parable. When Jesus spoke in parables it was usually introduced as a “parable” (see **Matthew 13:18, 24, 31, 33, et al**). Furthermore, when Jesus spoke in parables He *never used names*. Today we see “**a certain rich man**” and “**Lazarus**” in our text. This is a

true story. It is a look behind the scenes at what happens when we die. Let's look at our text.

1. Who Goes To Hell?

Who really goes to Hell, and who goes to Heaven? What we as humans think about this must be very amusing to God. Some people think that your eternal address will be based on *how good you were in this life*. Did you help little old ladies cross the road. Were you a good Boy Scout or Girl Scout? Did you give some of your money to help the poor? Did you go to Church? Were you a *nice* person? Then we automatically think that this person will go to Heaven when they die. Sometimes we think people will go to Heaven because they were miserable in this life. If somebody has had hard knocks in this life, has been poor, has suffered, then *surely* their next life will be better. They will go to Heaven. If someone has had a *great life*, with great riches, and have been born with a silver spoon in their mouth but stingy with what they have, with what they have given to the poor, then these people will go to Hell. Or people who - like *Hitler, Stalin, or Mussolini* - killed many people. They are going to Hell. The so called Serial Killers are going to Hell, people like *Ted Bundy* or *Charles Manson*. Oh, they'll be in Hell. In fact, if Hell were populated based on our opinions, the woman who cut us off in traffic, the boyfriend who dumped you, and anybody *not like me* would be in hell.

That's not what Jesus taught. Who goes to Hell, and who goes to Heaven? Look at your text. We see two men with two different stations in life. We read:

FOCAL Luke 16:19-21 There was a certain rich man, which was clothed in purple and fine linen, and fared sumptuously every day: (20) And there was a certain beggar named Lazarus, which was laid at his gate, full of sores, (21) And desiring to be fed with the crumbs which fell from the rich man's table: moreover the dogs came and licked his sores.

There is a **certain rich man**, a man who was very well off, and a **beggar named Lazarus**. This is the first clue as to who goes to Heaven and who goes to Hell. *Look at their names*. There is a **beggar named Lazarus**. He has a name. He is known to God. God knows his name! Why does God know Lazarus' name? Look in verse 22:

FOCAL Luke 16:22 ... **the beggar died, and was carried by the angels into Abraham's bosom ...**

What good deeds did the beggar Lazarus do? Did he go to Church? Did he give to the poor? What did he have to give? Absolutely nothing. This man had nothing.

Lazarus had one thing that the rich man didn't have: he had *faith in God*. We know this because of *where he was taken when he died*.

The Lord said "**the beggar was carried by the angels into Abraham's bosom**". Why is that significant? The Bible tells us that Abraham is the Father of Faith in God. Abraham - originally named Abram - was a man who lived in ancient Babylon, a place called Ur of the Chaldees (**Genesis 11:28**). God came to Abram one day and said to him:

Genesis 12:1-4 ... Get thee out of thy country, and from thy kindred, and from thy father's house, unto a land that I will shew thee: (2) And I will make of thee a great nation, and I will bless thee, and make thy name great; and thou shalt be a blessing: (3) And I will bless them that bless thee, and curse him that curseth thee: and in thee shall all families of the earth be blessed. (4) So Abram departed, as the LORD had spoken unto him

Abraham was a man who heard God. He had a relationship with the Lord by faith. The Bible tells us that:

James 2:23 ... Abraham believed God, and it was imputed unto him for righteousness: and he was called the Friend of God.

Abraham had faith in God. **He was the friend of God.** God called him, and Abraham moved. Abraham trusted in the Lord, and the Lord counted his trust as righteousness.

An interesting thing about this is that **Abraham was a rich man.** He didn't have any children, and was trusting the Lord to give him children. But Abraham had a *great deal of the riches of this world.* If you read **Genesis 13** you will see that Abraham had so much livestock that he could not dwell on the same range as his nephew Lot.

Abraham - though he had been rich in the wealth of this world - was in Heaven *because he knew the Lord*

by faith. The beggar Lazarus - though he had nothing in this life in the way of material goods - went to Abraham's bosom because *he, too, knew the Lord by faith.*

Our Lord Jesus Christ told the unbelieving Pharisees:

John 8:42-44 Jesus said unto them, If God were your Father, ye would love me: for I proceeded forth and came from God; neither came I of myself, but he sent me. (43) Why do ye not understand my speech? [even] because ye cannot hear my word. (44) Ye are of [your] father the devil, and the lusts of your father ye will do....

This angered the Pharisees. Yet Jesus went on to tell them:

John 8:56 Your father Abraham rejoiced to see my day: and he saw [it], and was glad.

God called Abraham to salvation, and **Abraham was saved by believing in the Lord Jesus Christ.** Abraham is therefore the **Father of all who believe.** He is the pattern on faith and of the faithful.

Abraham believed in the Lord Jesus Christ and was saved. Abraham - though rich - followed the Lord by faith in this life, and went to Heaven upon his death. The beggar Lazarus also went to Heaven - **to Abraham's embrace** - because he believed in Jesus.

The Bible says:

Proverbs 22:2 The rich and poor meet together: the LORD [is] the maker of them all.

God makes both the rich and the poor. Some people are born to riches. Others are born poor, and rise to riches. In a **Forbes Magazine** article dated June 26, 2007 we read:

"Almost two-thirds of the world's 946 billionaires made their fortunes from scratch, relying on grit and determination, and not good genes. Fifty of these self-made tycoons are college or high school dropouts. The most famous billionaire dropout is Microsoft's Bill Gates, who finally got his honorary degree from Harvard University in June {2007}, 30 years after quitting the prestigious school to sell software."

Abraham was a rich man who went to Heaven, and Lazarus was a poor man who went to Heaven, to exactly the same place as Abraham was. But the rich man in Christ's story went to Hell.

FOCAL Luke 16:22-23 the beggar died, and was carried by the angels into Abraham's bosom: the rich man also died, and was buried; (23) And in hell he lift up his eyes, being in torments, and seeth Abraham afar off, and Lazarus in his bosom.

The rich man - a man who was *nameless because he did not know the Lord, nor did he want to know the Lord in this life* - **lifted up his eyes in Hell, being in torments.** The rich man lived a life devoid of God,

and went to an afterlife devoid of God.

Look how the rich man is pictured.

FOCAL Luke 16:19 There was a certain rich man, which was clothed in purple and fine linen, and fared sumptuously every day:....

He was clothed in purple and fine linen. The rich man wore the finest of clothes. In the ancient world clothes were dyed from things which were found in nature. **Purple**, however, was the most difficult of all dyes to find.

"Tyrian Purple," the purple dye of the ancients mentioned in texts dating back to about 1600 B.C., was produced from the mucus of the hypobranchial gland of various species of marine mollusks, notably **Murex. It took some 12,000 shellfish to extract 1.5 grams of the pure dye.** Legend credits its discovery to Herakles, or rather to his dog, whose mouth was stained purple from chewing on snails along the Levantine coast. King Phoenix received a purple-dyed robe from Herakles and decreed the rulers of Phoenicia should wear this color as a royal symbol"

Because of it's difficulty in procuring it **purple** was only worn by royalty and the mega-rich. This **certain rich man** was mega-rich. **He fared sumptuously, with great luxury** (*λαμπρως pronounced lam-proce'*) the Lord tells us.

What great sins did the rich man commit? Was he an

adulterer? Did he steal his money? Did he murder somebody? No, not at all. Was the rich man *cruel to Lazarus*? No, the Lord doesn't say that.

FOCAL Luke 16:20-21 And there was a certain beggar named Lazarus, which was laid at his gate, full of sores, (21) And desiring to be fed with the crumbs which fell from the rich man's table: moreover the dogs came and licked his sores.

Lazarus - covered with sores - was laid in the gate of the rich man. The rich man wasn't cruel to Lazarus. He didn't run this homeless man away from his doorway. The rich man *ignored Lazarus, just like he ignored God*. His sin was that **his relationship with money was everything to him**. He had no relationship with the God Who loved him - his love was focused on money.

Jesus often warned of riches. Just prior to telling us today's story Jesus said:

CONTEXT Luke 16:13 "No servant can serve two masters. Either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and Money." NIV used here for clarity

He was called "**the rich man**" because money defined his life. God allowed the rich man to have life. He allowed the rich man to have his riches. He even gave the rich man the ability to earn money. The Bible warns:

1 Timothy 6:17-19 Command those who are rich in this present world not to be arrogant nor to put their hope in wealth, which is so uncertain, but to put their hope in God, who richly provides us with everything for our enjoyment. (18) Command them to do good, to be rich in good deeds, and to be generous and willing to share. (19) In this way they will lay up treasure for themselves as a firm foundation for the coming age, so that they may take hold of the life that is truly life.

Riches so often deceive people. Riches and being rich is not a sin. But when your riches take your eyes off of God, off of a saving relationship with Him through faith in Jesus Christ, then these riches pave your way unto Hell! If God has given you wealth, praise Him! If God has given you riches, thank Him! Enjoy the resources of what you have been given, but **do good with them**.

Never allow your riches to take the place of your relationship with God.

A rich young man came to Jesus one day asking Him how to have eternal life. Jesus told him:

Matthew 19:21-24 If thou wilt be perfect, go and sell that thou hast, and give to the poor, and thou shalt have treasure in heaven: and come and follow Me. (22) But when the young man heard that saying, he went away sorrowful: for he had great possessions. (23) Then said Jesus unto his disciples, Verily I say unto you, That a rich man shall hardly enter into the kingdom of heaven. (24) And again I say unto you, It

is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle, than for a rich man to enter into the kingdom of God.

Jesus told the young man two things: **liquify your assets, and do good with them (give to the poor) and follow Me.** The rich man couldn't follow Jesus because he was already under the lordship of Money. The **rich man** in today's story was in Hell because Money - not God - was his Lord.

Money is like manure: if you pile it up and hoard it, it stinks up your life. It is better to repent and give all that you have and all that you are to the Lord Jesus Christ, and you shall have an abundant life now and eternal life forever!

2. What Is Hell Like?

ILLUSTRATE People think that when they die, they either stay in the grave, or stay with their bodies. **Ted Williams, the Red Sox Baseball Hall of famer** who was the last man to bat over .400 in a season, died in 2002 at the age of 83 years old. In his last will and testament he had his head sent to the **Alcor Cryonics Facility** in Arizona. Alcor freezes your head, promising to preserve it until the day that science figures out how to overcome death. When that happens the head is supposed to be somehow reconstituted and Williams will be brought back from the dead. The irony of all this is that a technician that works for Alcor was caught taking swings at the Ted Williams head with a monkey wrench.

Will Ted Williams - or anyone else who has had their

head frozen - be brought back to life? Look at the Scripture. Jesus said:

FOCAL Luke 16:22-24 the rich man also died, and was buried; (23) And in hell he lifted up his eyes ...

a **No time passed from burial to Hell:** The rich man died and was buried. His body went into a grave. But what about his soul? The Lord Jesus said "**AND in HELL he lifted up his eyes**". Note first of all that absolutely *no time passes* from death to Hell. The rich man was *immediately* in Hell. He didn't have to be in Hell. He could have been with God in eternity if, instead of worshiping his riches, he had come to the Lord Jesus Christ. The Bible tells us that:

John 3:16-18 For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life. (17) For God sent not his Son into the world to condemn the world; but that the world through him might be saved. (18) He that believeth on him is not condemned: but he that believeth not is condemned already, because he hath not believed in the name of the only begotten Son of God.

If you are holding on to this world's riches and refusing to come to the Lord Jesus Christ as your Savior, then you are playing Russian Roulette with your life. **God sent His Son into this world so that the WORLD - that's anybody - might be SAVED from Hell. He that believes on Jesus Christ is NOT condemned. But he**

that refuses to give himself to Jesus, who refuses to have a relationship with God by faith in Christ is *condemned already*. The Lord said:

Mark 8:34-37 And when he had called the people unto him with his disciples also, he said unto them, **Whosoever will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me. (35) For whosoever will save his life shall lose it; but whosoever shall lose his life for my sake and the gospel's, the same shall save it. (36) For what shall it profit a man, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? (37) Or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?**

The greatest possession you own is not your car, your house, your bank account. It is *your soul*. God casts *no one* into Hell. You choose whether you go to Heaven or Hell. You choose whether you will follow Jesus or follow the rich man. You choose!

b Those who are in Hell have *no relationship with God whatsoever*. Look again at our text:

FOCAL Luke 16:24 the rich man cried and said, **Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus, that he may dip the tip of his finger in water, and cool my tongue; for I am tormented in this flame.**

People are in Hell because they *choose* to be in Hell. The

rich man *did not call out to God* for relief from the torment.

Note that - even in torment - the rich man *did not call out to God*.

When you spend a lifetime ignoring God's call to salvation, ignoring what Jesus Christ did for you on the Cross, ignoring even your own impending death - then the torment even of Hell cannot burn through the scar tissue of your damaged soul. The Bible says

1 Samuel 20:3 [there is] but a step between me and death.

and yet the rich man kept putting this out of his mind. The Bible says:

Hebrews 9:27-28 And as it is appointed unto men once to die, but after this the judgment: (28) So Christ was once offered to bear the sins of many; and unto them that look for him shall he appear the second time without sin unto salvation.

Everyone dies. "**The rich man ALSO died**". Death is inevitable! Doctors die, bankers die, students die, preachers die. *Sometimes even little babies drop their toys, and wrestle with the cold grip of death*. Everyone dies. Dear friends, babies who die before the age of accountability go to be with the Lord. But once you reach the age of accountability the Lord wants you to come to Him, believing on the Lord Jesus Christ as your Savior. It doesn't matter what the world says, nor what

your friends say.

Hebrews 13:12-13 Wherefore Jesus also, that he might sanctify the people with his own blood, suffered without the gate. (13) Let us go forth therefore unto him without the camp, bearing his reproach.

The Lord Jesus Christ *went against what the world said*, shedding His Blood for your salvation and mine. You need to *stop following the world and peer pressure*, coming to Jesus Christ by faith "**outside the camp**", while you can.

If you keep on hardening your hearts against the Lord in this life, you will find yourselves in Hell in the next life crying out to and blaming others - rather than calling on God.

C Hell is a place of unending torment, from which there is no reprieve! Again we read:

FOCAL Luke 16:24-26 cool my tongue; for I am tormented in this flame. (25) But Abraham said, Son, remember that thou in thy lifetime receivedst thy good things, and likewise Lazarus evil things: but now he is comforted, and thou art tormented. (26) And beside all this, between us and you there is a great gulf fixed: so that they which would pass from hence to you cannot; neither can they pass to us, that would come from thence.

You may not like it, but Jesus was very clear that Hell is a place of torment from which there is *no reprieve*. There is a **great gulf fixed** between Heaven and Hell, and no one can cross this gulf to relieve the sufferers of Hell. These people are in a fixed and eternal place, for they fixed their hearts and refused the Lord Who loved them.

Hell is a place of **everlasting fire**.

Matthew 25:41-46 Then shall he say also unto them on the left hand, Depart from me, ye cursed, into everlasting fire, prepared for the devil and his angels ...

It was not a place that was designed for man, but **for the devil and his fallen angels**. The Lord doesn't want you in Hell, but He will not force you into Heaven. Heaven wouldn't be Heaven if you were forced there anyway! You have a choice, just as God has a choice.

To get to hell you have to climb over the witness of the Scripture, the witness of the Holy Spirit, and the witness of the Church.

The Bible tells us:

2 Peter 3:9 The Lord is not slack concerning his promise, as some men count slackness; but is longsuffering to us-ward, not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance.

God wants *everyone* to come to repentance. He wants *whosoever will* to be saved. But the choice is yours. God

chose to die for you. Jesus Christ gave up His life so that absolutely no one has to go to Hell. The Bible says:

Romans 5:8 But God commendeth his love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us.

1 Timothy 2:3-6 For this [is] good and acceptable in the sight of God our Saviour; (4) Who will have all men to be saved, and to come unto the knowledge of the truth. (5) For [there is] one God, and one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus; (6) Who gave himself a ransom for all, to be testified in due time.

No where in this story Jesus told do we see the false teachings of *reincarnation* or *purgatory* or even a *second chance*. The Lord has given every believer second chances, and third chances, and some many many more chances than that. Today is the day of salvation!

d When you go to Hell, or when you go to Heaven - you do not go ALONE! Hell is *sensual* misery, *emotional* misery, *eternal* misery, and *spiritual* misery. When the rich man could find no solace for his torment, notice what he says:

FOCAL Luke 16:27-28 ... I pray thee therefore, father, that thou wouldest send him to my father's house: (28) For I have five brethren; that he may

testify unto them, lest they also come into this place of torment.

The rich man *remembered his brothers*, and wanted Lazarus to go and testify to those brothers "lest they also come into this place of torment".

May I say to you, dear friend, that each of you have influence over others lives. If you go to Hell, you'll not go alone. The rich man realized this and begged Abraham to send Lazarus to be a testimony from the dead. He thought "Well, if Lazarus goes, they will surely hear and come to this place". What did Abraham reply? He said:

Luke 16:29-31 Abraham saith unto him, They have Moses and the prophets; let them hear them. (30) And he said, Nay, father Abraham: but if one went unto them from the dead, they will repent. (31) And he said unto him, If they hear not Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded, though one rose from the dead.

Our Lord Jesus Christ rose from the dead, and walked on this earth teaching and preaching for forty days before He ascended unto Heaven. The Apostle Paul said:

1 Corinthians 15:3-6 ... Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures; (4) And that he was buried, and that he rose again the third day according to the Scriptures: (5) And that he was seen of Cephas, then of the twelve: (6) After that, he was seen of above five hundred brethren at once;...

Over five hundred people saw the Risen Savior. Jesus came back from the dead, walked and talked, was touched, and ate with over five hundred. Do you know what the unbelievers published abroad? The unbelieving Jews said "**Jesus never really died on that Cross. He just swooned, passing out, and His disciples covered it up and pretended like He rose from the dead**".

Abraham said "**If they will not hear Moses and the Prophets (the testimony of the Scripture) they will not be persuaded, though one rose from the dead**". God has left us a witness to salvation in His Scripture. He has told us all about Heaven and Hell in this Word of God. You will either believe what God has said, or reject His Word. But there will be no second chance once you are in Hell.

Hell is forever. Hell is your choice. Heaven is forever. Heaven is forever. Choose Heaven. Choose the Lord Jesus!

We wrestle with life, and wrestle with death. The only way to win in the arenas of either life and death is by giving yourselves without reserve to the Lord Jesus Christ. He alone is King of Kings and Lord of Lords. He alone has both conquered life as well as death. The same Jesus Who turned water into wine can transform your home, your life, your family, and your future. He is still in the miracle-working business, and His business is the business of transformation.

There's an old saying that goes like this: "**It's not**

WHAT you know but WHO you know". That is *very true* when it comes to where you will stay forever. Do you know the Lord Jesus Christ? Have you believed on Him and Him alone for your salvation? If not, today is the day you need to be saved!

May God lead you to come to the Lord Jesus Christ and be saved!
